2. Approve Parks and Recreation Commission Minutes of October 3, 2022

MOTION by Commissioner Larson to APPROVE the October 3, 2022 meeting minutes. SECONDED by Commissioner Graham. The MOTION PASSED unanimously.

NEW BUSINESS/ACTION ITEMS

3. Parks and Recreation – Staff Introductions Skyler Ruetz

Mike Maher, Parks and Recreation Director, introduced new staff member Sklyer Ruetz.

Sklyer Ruetz, Recreation Specialist, introduced herself to the Commission.

4. Anoka County Parks Staff Presentation on Rice Creek West Regional Trail Corridor Engagement Findings

Karen Blaska, Anoka County Parks Planner, provided a presentation on the Rice Creek West Regional Trail Corridor engagement findings. She reviewed the things that people like about the park, barriers to visiting, and safety concerns that were identified. She provided input received related to trails, winter recreation, wayfinding and signage, the creek, the dog park, the playground, activities, and mountain biking. She summarized the items that should be improved per the input received as well as things that people find beneficial in the parks. She reviewed the demographics of the public input and the results of the Metropolitan Council survey. She highlighted her next steps noting that she will be developing a draft plan that she will share with stakeholders.

The Commission asked for verification on whether the survey included the parks or just the trail. Ms. Blaska commented that the focus was on the trail even though it goes through parks.

A member of the Commission commented that it would be helpful to have a Rice Creek Trail 101 to improve knowledge of the corridor. The Commission asked for input on the possible dissolution of the JPA. Ms. Blaska replied that until that is official, they will remain as partners in the project. She stated that if the park were returned to Fridley, they would still proceed with the trail project.

OTHER BUSINESS

Mayor Lund commented that he was present to hear the presentation from Anoka County. He noted that the dissolution of the JPA has been considered by different commissions and will be formally considered by the City Council at its meeting the following week. He summarized some of the concerns the City has had with the partnership with Anoka County on the parks within the JPA. He was glad to see the County develop a master plan but believed it still lacks attention in some areas and a lack of actual partnership with the City.

A member of the Commission commented that perhaps this is too little, too late for the County and it was noted that there was still a lack of attention to the other two parks within the JPA. The Commission thanked Mayor Lund and Ms. Blaska for their presentations.

STAFF REPORTS

5. Springbrook Nature Center Report

Mr. Maher reviewed the report highlighted different programming opportunities that have occurred with school children this past month. He noted that there was record attendance for Pumpkin Night in the Park this year and provided a summary of the event details. He also highlighted upcoming events. He provided some ideas on how they could stagger people entering the Pumpkin Night in

the Park event or limit attendance in future years as there were some long lines at times. He also commented on the green roof project that has been completed.

6. Fridley Parks and Recreation Division Report

Mr. Maher highlighted recent programming events and participation for youth and adult programs. He also noted a recent conference his department staff attended.

7. Park Maintenance and Construction Report

Mr. Maher summarized the work staff is doing to prepare for the transition to the winter months.

ADJOURNMENT

Commissioner Larson made the MOTION to adjourn the meeting at 7:56 p.m., SECONDED by Commissioner Graham. The MOTION PASSED unanimously.

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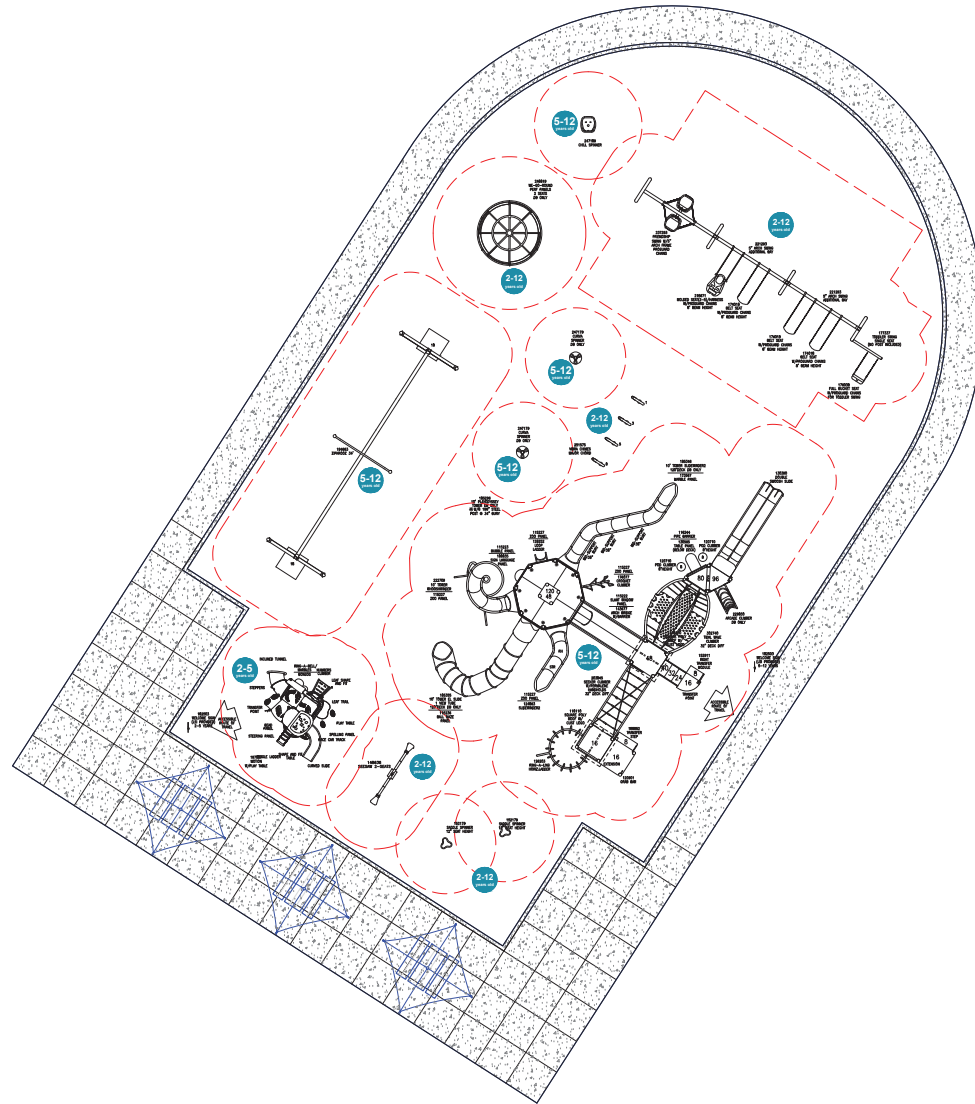

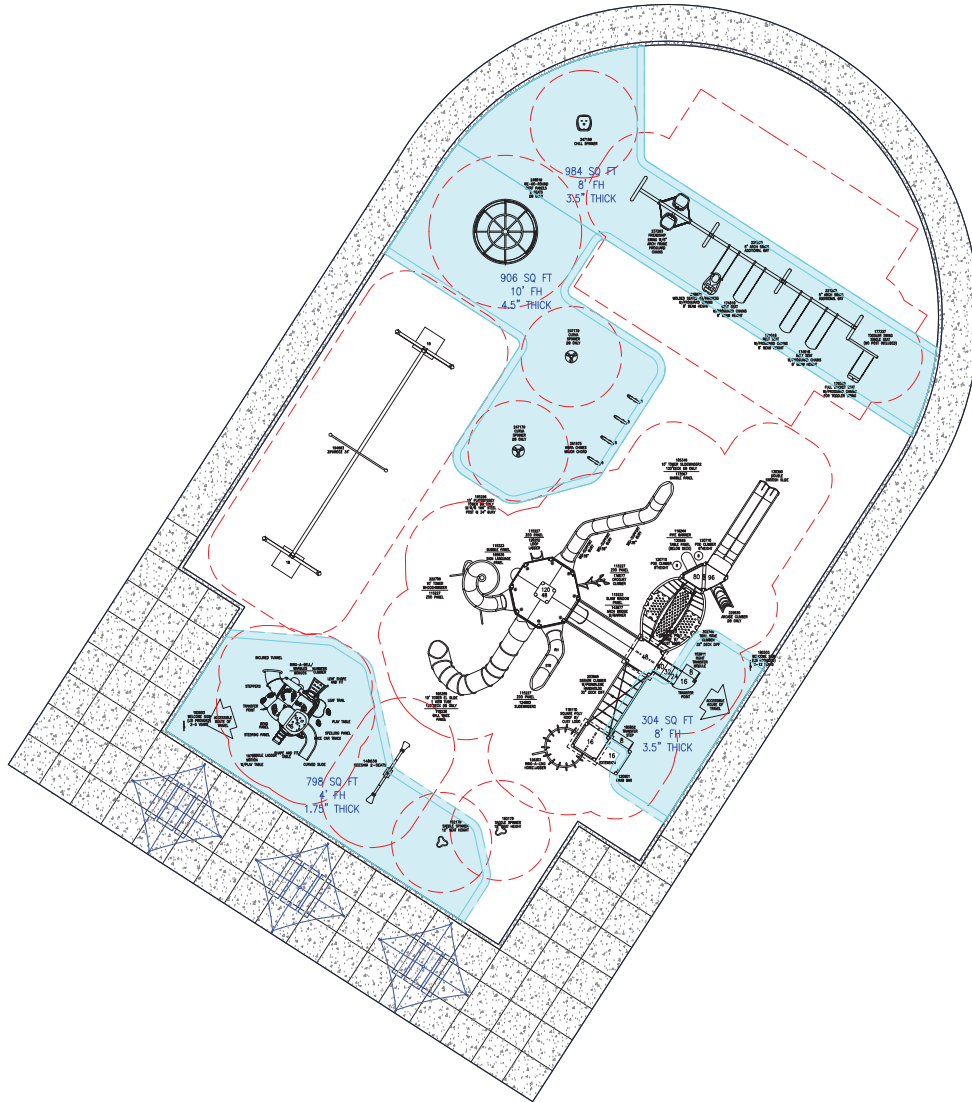

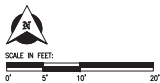

Park & Rec Commission Report

November Highlights

- Springbrook Naturalists have seen about 1,100 Fridley students this month covering such topics as: Mineral Classification (4th grade), Water Cycles (4th grade), Water Scarcity in the World (4th grade), Seed Dispersal (2nd grade), Climate Change and Carbon Footprint (8th grade), Designing Cities and Carbon Footprints (8th grade), and Survival Challenge and Culminating Field Trip (8th grade).
- Springbrook Naturalists have seen about 350 students this month on the Nature Trail. They've learned about Stream Study (4th grade), Soils (1st grade), and GPS Course (5th grade).
- This month's rentals have included 5 rental groups using our indoor classroom. Groups ranged from business meetings, family gatherings, and a wedding.
- Naturalists have also led four birthday parties this month.
- Springbrook Naturalists attended (and presented) at the Minnesota Naturalists Association conference at Long Lake Conservation Center in Palisade MN. The skill sharing and networking were invigorating. The staff came back with lots of new ideas and perspectives.
- SNC served as a polling location for the mid—term elections.

Upcoming this Season

- Lantern Light Hikes will start in December and run through March on the second Friday of each month. Enjoy lantern lit trails, a cozy bonfire, and the great outdoors. Cost is \$5 per person, snowshoe rental available for an additional \$5 (provided there is a 3 inch base of snow).
- SNC will be closed to the public from December 24 – January 2 so that we can take care of ongoing maintenance (floor refinishing and building repainting).
- Springbrook will be hosting the City of Fridley Annual Meeting on December 1st. We look forward to providing a pleasant place to hear about the successes of the city and gathering with coworkers to celebrate a great year.
- Winterfest will take place at Springbrook on Saturday January 21 from 11 am – 2 pm. Come out and enjoy the winter weather with activities including but not limited to: snowshoeing, medallion hunting, kick sleds, and fat tire biking.

Grants

- Xcel Energy Grant 2022 is being used to install an new exhibit: "The Power of Prairies". Dina Cyrus is getting started with graphic design, interactive element design, and is meeting with fabricators for some custom wood work for the exhibit. We look forward to a fun and educational experience.
- We have been awarded an International Paper Grant entitled "Building Aquatic and Ecological Literacy". We will put together new curriculum for onsite field trips, summer camps, scout groups, and others. We will include an additional canoe, PFDs, fishing rods and cases, miscellaneous fishing equipment and additional paddles.

The Nov/Dec brochure was sent to residents at the end of October. Program staff has completed content for the Jan/Feb brochure and it is currently being designed.

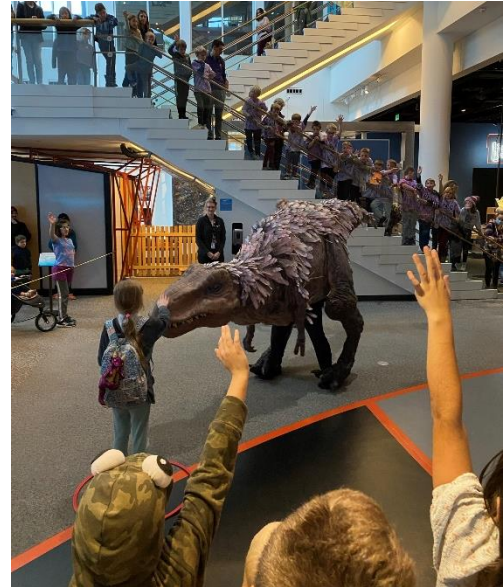


November Field Trip

On Tuesday, November 8th, children in grades K-5 joined our Recreation Staff for an exciting day at the Minnesota Science Museum. Trip highlights included: Omnitheatre Show, Backyard Wilderness, and exhibits, Cardboard City and Sportsology. We had ten participants.

After-School Classes

The second session of After-school Programs began on Tuesday, November 15th. Classes include: Multi-Sports League, Martial Arts & Light Sabers, Painting, and Basketball League. We have great participation in this session and children are enjoying the activities. We continue to work closely with Fridley School District staff on dismissal procedures and the snack program.



Family Open Gym

We began Family Open Gym at Hayes Elementary School again from 10:15 a.m. – 12:15 p.m. on Saturday, November 5th. Cost is \$2 per child or \$4 per family, five visit punch cards can also be purchased for a reduced rate. Participants are encouraged to play together using a variety of equipment including: balls, hoops, scooters, jump ropes, a bouncy house and more! Staff have been working to increase promotion for this program and Saturday, November 19th we reached a record attendance of 30 participants. We look forward to serving more families with this program.

Pickleball Courts

On Saturday afternoons beginning on November 5th, we are offering Pickleball Court reservations. Staff have lined three courts in the Hayes Gym. For the month of November (11/5, 12 and 19) we have had five reservation totaling seven hours. The cost is \$15 per hour.

Adult Sport Leagues Starting Soon!

Registrations are coming in for Winter Adult Sports Leagues. Sports offered: Men's Basketball, Bag Toss, Pickleball, Volleyball and Boot Hockey. We are working with neighboring communities to offer all except the Men's Basketball League and are looking forward to building partnerships and successful programs!

Moore Lake Park Design

The City has hired a construction manager, Krause Anderson, to oversee the construction of the Moore Lake Park Community Building. They will help with budgeting, bidding, and oversight of contractors. Refinements are ongoing to the site and building plan and a status update will be shared with the City Council at the December 12th Conference Meeting and will be shared with the Commission at the following scheduled meeting.

City Council Passes Resolution to Exit Locke Park Joint Powers Agreement

As was discussed with the Commission at the October meeting, the Fridley City Council did pass a resolution to exit the Locke Park Joint Powers Agreement with Anoka County. The agreement states that either party can exit the agreement with a notice of one year. The Commission will remain informed and involved as the City assumes responsibility for maintenance, operation and programming at this park.

The Park Maintenance Division has been working on getting all ice-skating rinks started. Hopefully we will have good ice making weather and an earlier than normal opening of the skating rinks. We have packed all the snow, and flooded all rinks, to start the ground freezing process. If it does warm up it will melt just the top layers and we will have a good base.

We have plowed all sidewalks a few times and have also done some tree work. We are also working on Moore Lake beach house trying to remove hazardous and recyclable materials to help save on the demolition costs for the building. We have removed the air compressor so there will be no open ice on the lake this winter.
